A former executive producer and on-air television host for NBC Bay Area – KNTV, Reilly and her husband own the San Francisco Examiner and the Nob Hill Gazette. Reilly earned a B.A. from UCLA and an M.S. in journalism from the Northwestern University Medill School of Journalism.

Laurel Rosenhall writes about California politics for The New York



Times. Based in Sacramento, she has been a journalist in California for more than two decades,

mostly covering state politics and policy. Previously, Rosenhall led coverage of the state capitol for The Los Angeles Times and served for a year on its editorial board. She was also a reporter at CalMatters, a nonprofit news site she helped launch in 2015, and began her reporting career at The Sacramento Bee. Rosenhall studied journalism at UC Berkeley.



Michael Wiafe is

assistant deputy cabinet secretary in the Office of Governor Gavin

Newsom, where he works on education cradle-to-career. He previously worked at the Inland Empire Community Foundation and was an adjunct professor at the University of Redlands. Wiafe got his start in policy as president of the Cal State Student Association, representing the over 480,000 students of the California State University system. He earned a B.A. from San Diego State University and a master's in Public Policy from UC Berkeley.

MEET OUR PANELISTS



Samuel Assefa

directs the California Governor's Office of Land Use and Climate Innovation.

Previously, Assefa was the director of the Seattle Office of Planning and Community Development (2016–21), a senior urban designer with the City of Boulder (2010–16) and Chicago's director of land use and planning policy (2004–10). In California, Assefa served as director of special projects for the San Francisco Department of Planning and Development (1999– 2002). Assefa earned a master's degree in City Planning from MIT.



Former California State Senator **Bill Dodd** spent 25 years in public service. The fifth-generation

Californian was a successful business owner before being elected to the Napa County Board of Supervisors, the state Assembly and the state Senate. During his tenure Dodd authored 126 bills that were signed into law. He is a partner in Dodd and Chaaban Strategies and serves as a director of a public company and two startups. Dodd and his wife live in Napa and have five children and thirteen grandchildren.



Lisa García Bedolla is UC Berkeley's vice provost for Graduate Studies and Hitchcock Dean of the

Graduate Division, and Chancellor's Professor in the School of Education. She uses the tools of social science to reveal the causes of educational and political inequalities in the United States, considering differences across the lines of ethnorace, gender, class, geography, et cetera. She believes an intersectional and interdisciplinary approach is critical to recognizing the complexity of the contemporary U.S.



Gillian Wilson is the vice chancellor for research, innovation and economic development at UC

Merced. Her administrative portfolio includes managing UC Merced's research administration offices, shared core research facilities, organized research units, Natural Reserve System, Agricultural Experiment Station and the Central California Small Business Development Center network. Wilson is a professor in the UC Merced Department of Physics and a fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, the American Physical Society and the American Astronomical Society.
